The car that hit her never stopped or gave a second thought to her life or well being. This young beauty was rescued by MHAA and cowered in her cage, traumatized by her ordeal. She had a broken leg, fractured pelvis and abrasions on her chin. Brought into the safety and warmth that your donations provide, she received veterinary care, pain medication and lots of TLC at MHAA.

Splendora is recuperating in the care of a wonderful vet, and three weeks after her surgery is energetic and feeling great. She is friendly and gets along with the foster dog and cats. She received laser treatment for her leg and got to wear wonderful magic goggles.

Sweet Splendora is a little shy but if you put her in your lap, she will reward you with snuggles and enthusiastic purs. Nicknamed "Splendorable", she will make a wonderful pet if you give her a chance!

Rodan is recovering from a self created, infected abscess and needs monetary and emotional support. His despair is so great, that his best hope for healing is with a loving and patient family.

Emaciated and dehydrated, Rodan arrived at MHAA after weeks of trying to get out from under someone's deck. In the process, he caused serious injury to his leg and was at a major risk of sepsis. He had surgery to lance, debride and stitch up the infected abscess in his joint. At only five pounds, Rodan looked as if he was trying to make himself as small as possible to protect from the harshness of life. His heartbreaking look conveyed endless pain, fear, and desperation. After treating his immediate wounds, Rodan was treated for fluid in his abdomen and a form of blood borne pernicious anemia. He had had the infection in his legs going on for so long and was extremely emaciated from starvation, his body just couldn't keep up and mycoplasma started to cause him to be extraordinarily anemic.

Three months later Rodan is doing so much better. It is crucial to procure a quiet home with a family willing to shower him with attention and calm his fears.
